Conflict and Climate

On Remembrance Sunday, Watlington Climate Action Group will be laying a wreath for the first time - although we are not yet sure of the precise arrangements due to the new Lockdown.

It is important to us, as a community organisation, to pay our respects to the sacrifices made by Watlington residents, as well as to reflect on the damage wrought by conflicts around the world.

The changes we are seeing as a result of the Climate Emergency are already leading to increased conflicts globally, and this is likely to escalate as the impact of higher temperatures and more extreme weather come to bear. Pressure on resources such as water and food are likely to lead to increased migration, conflict, and war.

The picture isn't straightforward, with many different causes for any given conflict. However, a study published last year by Nature found that climate change has the effect of making conflict more likely to occur. According to the study "as risks grow under future climate change, many more potential climate-conflict linkages become relevant."

This Remembrance Day, we will be remembering, and reflecting on how our actions today might influence the likelihood of conflict in the future, whilst acknowledging that togetherness is likely to be the path to a more harmonious future.

October was brightened considerably thanks to all the events that were run as part of the Nature Festival. The brain child of Sophie Nelson, the Nature Festival was inspired by the feeling of reconnecting with Nature that many people experienced as a result of the first Lockdown in March. Celebrate our beautiful British trees!

Last year for National Tree Week we worked with Babylon Plants to supply trees to Watlington residents. About 30 trees were planted in the parish as a result, ranging from Silver Birch, to twisted Hazel, Scots Pine and Cordon fruit trees, Spindle and more.

This year we are not planning a specific event but would like to encourage anyone who has some space in their garden or land to consider planting trees. It is important to plant trees now to sink carbon for the future and help the climate crisis. National Tree Week is running from 28th November – 6th December.

If you are aware of any land which might be available for tree planting, please get in touch. Land the size of a tennis court could be planted as a "mini forest" or a larger area could be planted formally or using rewilding techniques
