We are still getting local businesses to be "Plastic Free Champions", the latest being The Orange Bakery who use paper bags for their products and also sell cloth bread bags to enable their customers to re-use rather than using singleuse plastic. They also encourage their customers to bring reusable mugs for their soup.

Al Tait explained, "Sustainability is at the heart of what we do - it is built into the fabric of how we work. We source our ingredients locally as much as we can, and going plastic-free is an important part of that bigger picture. We are delighted to be part of the club of Watlington businesses that have joined this scheme"

Green Plan

Thank you to Fiona Danks for the following update:

The Green Plan is a collaborative approach to protecting and enhancing biodiversity and green spaces within the parish, which we seek to do through various projects and through increasing awareness of the value of local habitats. We welcome volunteers and will seek to find different ways to involve anyone who is interested in working with us.

Hedgerow Project

As we start to emerge from lockdown and the winter, our team of hedgerow survey volunteers will resume their survey of all the hedgerows in the parish. The plan is to complete the survey over the spring and summer months with a view to identifying planting projects to improve existing hedgerows and create new ones for next autumn. We would welcome additional volunteers to get involved with planting hedgerows. Nicola Schafer's film Hedgerow Project (see https://www.watlingtonclimateaction.org.uk/) has now had about 2800 views on YouTube and we have bene contacted by other local community environment groups seeking to do similar projects in their area. We are setting up a website to share information about how to run a local hedgerow project.

Mapping the parish

Mapping of green spaces in the parish will continue during the spring when and summer; we are hoping this will identify possible sites for tree planting but also for other habitat improvements to enhance biodiversity and sequester carbon. We wish to ensure that the parish has a diversity of well managed habitats and we recognise the role of non-forested sites such as grassland and wetlands in sequestering carbon, mainly in the soil.

Community Orchard

There will be an opportunity in the future to create a community orchard on one of the development sites, but it has been suggested that there could be a dispersed community orchard in Watlington, with a few fruit and nut trees planted in community spaces. The first step is to identify where there are existing fruit and nut trees in the town; please email Terry Jackson at tjacks@waitrose.com if you would like to let us know if you have orchard trees in your garden.

Recipe of the Month!

Thank you to Rowan Price for this delicious recipe using seasonal, local produce. We know eating more vegetables in our diet is good for the planet - and Rowan's mouthwatering recipe shows that this doesn't have to be boring or bland!



MARCH RECIPE

Total time 10 minutes

Serves 4

Ingredients

Pinch of salt 200g Kale 125g pumpkin seeds (you can swap these out for sunflower seeds, almonds or pine nuts) Juice of 1 lemon 70ml of olive oil 2 -3 roasted garlic Small bunch parsley

Method

Roast the garlic, with skin on in the oven for 15-20 minutes at $180\ensuremath{\text{C}}$.

Squeeze out the pulp from the garlic, once cool. Toast the pumpkin seeds, by placing the seeds in a dry pan on a low heat until golden.

Put all ingredients in the blender and blend until smooth, add a little extra oil if needs to blend well. Add to 100g of pasta per person for a quick and easy meal.

Notes

Reeps for up to a week and can be frozen in portions.

CEE Bill

Calling all businesses! Have you signed up to the Open Letter from businesses to Oxfordshire MPs asking them to support the CEE Bill? Do you know a business which might be interested?

The Open Letter calls on Anneliese Dodds, David Johnston, John Howell, Robert Courts and Victoria Prentis to support the CEE Bill (the Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill), which would essentially commit the UK to following the scientific advice on tackling climate change and biodiversity loss. If adopted, the bill would oblige current and future governments to work to keep temperature rise within 1.5°C, beyond which we risk runaway climate change, and to act to restore habitats and ecosystems which remove CO2 from the atmosphere.
