
Visit from new County Councillor Pete Sudbury, and Chair of CPRE Richard Harding

We were delighted to host Pete and Richard at a meeting organised by Green Plan members Roselle Chapman (Wild Oxfordshire) and Helen Marshall (CPRE), to talk hedges and road verges.

We met at the intersection between the Ridgeway, where Nigel Adams had planted up gaps in the hedgerow, and Britwell Road, which is a long establised Road Verge Nature Reserve, set up by Watlington Environment Group.

It was amazing to see the sheer variety of flora, including the pretty Greater Knapweed with its purple flowers (see header photo), and the fascinating Knapweed Broomrape, which is a parasitic plant, gaining its nutrients from the root system of the former. The Broomrape has no chlorophyll, hence its lack of green pigmentation. Check out the blog for more details!

Chalk Stream Film Project

Following on from our Hedgerow film, which has helped raise awareness of our hedgerow project and the importance of hedgerows in general for biodiversity and carbon sequestration, we are looking to create a film focusing on our precious Chalk Stream.

Chalk streams are a globally rare habitat and important from a point of view of the biodiversity they support. But they are also under threat. This film will feature the great work by Watlington Environment Group, the River Thame Conservation Trust and others to protect and restore the habitat. The film aims to encourage people to connect with nature and protect their local environment.

We are delighted to announce that we have a grant confirmed by Magic Little Grants, The Cobb Charity, our county councillor Freddie van Mierlo, and Watlington Parish Council towards this project, which gets us on our way. Thank you so much to these organisations for supporting this film, and to everyone who has helped with developing the film proposal and the funding applications.

Watlington Climate Action Group Recipes

Summer Middle-Eastern Total Time: 30 Minutes Salad

Dressing

2 tbsp tahini

2 tbsp water

2 tbsp lemon juice

2 tsp runny honey

Ingredients

Serves: 4

1cauliflower

4 tbsp olive oil 1tsp ground cumin

1tsp ground ginger

1tsp ground cinnamon Pinch of cayenne pepper

Pinch of salt and black pepper

1 red onion, finally sliced

400g cooked lentils

12 pitted dried dates 80g toasted almonds

150g spinach

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220°C and line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.
- 2. Trim and cut the cauliflower into florets. Coat the cauliflower with the spices and oil, and bake on the tray for 25 minutes until the cauliflower is golden and tender.
- 3. Place all the ingredients for the dressing in a bowl and whisk until smooth. Toss in the lentils until well covered.
- 4. Thinly slices the dates and roughly chop the almonds. Add half to the lentils along with the cooked cauliflower, sliced onion and the
- 5. Scatter the remaining dates and almonds around the top of the dish and serve.

Notes.

For a nut free version use sunflower or pumpkin seeds.
