Streaming Services - Climate Friend or Foe?

In this time of lockdown streaming services such as Netflix, Amazon Prime, BBC iPlayer and the like have been a boon, entertaining us when we've had to stay at home. Video conferencing services have helped keep businesses running when we've not been able to go to work. And all of this has helped keep cars off the road, and planes on the ground. Great for the environment, right?

Unfortunately all those streaming services actually come with an environmental impact too. Vast data centres have sprung up, requiring enormous amounts of electricity to run, not to mention the carbon footprint of all the equipment required for the storage and transmission of all that data. The total impact of digital technologies was estimated by Paris based think tank The Shift Project to be 4 % of global carbon emissions last year, and forecast to grow to 8% by 2025. 80% of that is online videos, including live video streaming such as Skype

calls.

However, it is not all gloom and doom as there is much that service providers can do to make their operations more environmentally friendly. Simply by switching to renewable electricity, rather than using fossil fuels, for a start.

This area has seemed invisible and with many companies involved in providing complex infrastructure, it has been easier to just call all of it "The Cloud" – something that has become difficult to see how to influence.

The good news is, we don't have to stop binge – streaming the latest television series, or go back to commuting rather than logging onto Zoom or Google Hangouts. But we can make a difference. For example, we can let our providers know we are watching what they are doing to be more environmentally friendly. The Disney + channel – one of the worst offenders according to the Ethical Consumer website - is currently offering a free week, so you can sign up and then cancel giving their environmental credentials as the reason.

So, if all of that has left you wondering how your favourite streaming services are doing with regard to the environment, check out the Ethical Consumer website and search for "streaming services" for a complete ranking.

What you can do to help: Sign up for Disney+ free week and then cancel it, citing environmental concerns, or contact your streaming service and ask what their plans are to be more environmentally friendly. Consumer pressure works!



Green Plan

The first project meeting for the Green Plan was held on Wednesday 13th May when a few people from WCAG, WEG, the Watlington Neighbourhood Plan Group and other interested individuals met on Zoom to consider next steps. The key points from the meeting were:

- Everyone agreed it would be a good idea to develop a Green Plan for Watlington to identify areas of green space and biodiversity interest, to identify possible projects to improve biodiversity and opportunities to manage habitats better for carbon sequestration, including tree planting.
- It was also agreed that this should be co-ordinated by a steering group
 with representation from different groups with an interest in this area ie;
 WCAG, WEG, the Neighbourhood Plan Group, Watlington in Bloom, the
 Parish Council, and potentially other Watlington groups

- The wider community could be involved in various ways, particularly through encouraging people to record wildlife in their gardens and to improve gardens as wildlife habitats.
- Various people put their names forward at the Town Hall meeting on the 12th March and Fiona will be in contact shortly
- Need to learn from other communities eg; Thame Green Plan, and also Eynsham's Nature Recovery Project, and the Benson Nature Group
- A key aim is to sequester carbon through natural solutions need to find a way to measure impact.
- We should identify some projects that could be progressed soon while having a few longer-term and more ambitious project ideas for the future.
- Priorities to take forward are:
 - A Mapping project to identify what we have, led by Roselle Chapman
 - A Hedgerow survey to find out more about existing hedgerows and draw up a plan for improving and planting hegderows, led by Nigel Adams
 - Gardens how we can promote key messages on biodiversity
 - Road verges, led by Robert Barber
 - A community orchard and "edible" hedgerow
 - Consulting on new developments
- There are a number of other possible projects, including ponds, tree planting, wildlife corridors, and working with local farmers and landowners.
